Dear President Xi,

The Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ), an independent, nonprofit press freedom organization, writes to request your urgent attention to the matter of journalists imprisoned in China ahead of International Human Rights Day on December 10.

According to data compiled by CPJ, your government holds at least 50 journalists in prison because of their work — making China the world's worst jailer of reporters. This includes seven journalists who are being held in Hong Kong.

Those behind bars include British publisher Jimmy Lai Chee-ying, whose health is rapidly deteriorating in a Hong Kong prison, and prominent Chinese journalist Dong Yuyu, who was imprisoned for having lunch with a Japanese diplomat in Beijing. The data indicates a trend of using anti-state charges to target journalists, with at least 34 behind bars for vague and overly broad crimes such as "subversion of state power" and "inciting subversion."

In December 2016, you said in a statement that "China needs to know better about the world and the world needs to know better about China." These words resonate with journalists, including those in China who seek to explain the country's perspectives, aspirations, and complexities to the global community.

If China truly aspires to engage with the world from a position of confidence and openness, its journalists must be able to do their jobs safely without fear of reprisal.

China's constitution guarantees freedom of speech and of the press. To mark International Human Rights Day, we urge your government to uphold these values by taking steps that would allow all imprisoned journalists to return to their families. Your personal attention to this matter would demonstrate a
