Resources for protecting data and devices for journalists in the US

Following the [raid of a Washington Post reporter's home](#) and the seizure of the reporter's electronic devices, the [U.S. Journalist Assistance Network](#) has compiled a set of resources with best practices for journalists in the U.S. to protect their data and devices.

Journalists and newsrooms in the U.S. can take proactive steps to secure their essential data and minimize the amount of sensitive information compromised if their devices are seized.

Essential steps include: Auditing what information you have and where it is stored, encrypting all stored materials and devices, regularly powering down devices, and creating processes for backing up and deleting sensitive data.
